Friends,

Did you enjoy our cool Fiesta Castle Hills? It was a delight! The cool weather appears to be gone and now we are on our way to a long summer ready for Concerts in the Commons and movie nights with the family.

Street Updates

What would a Reporter article be like if you didn't have SOME mention of streets and drainage? At the April Council meeting, City Council voted to approve the reconstruction of Glentower, as part of the shared street improvement plan. The contractors plan to be done by the end of the summer at the latest but they expect to have it done sooner!

Next on the list of streets are North Manton and Carolwood, both of which will be comprehensive street AND drainage projects to finally address the flooding that occurs after the smallest rains. It is worth noting that the drainage improvements that we are making will help with the majority of rains but the 20, 50, and 100 year rains may still present some challenges. Council had discussed "upsizing" but it was incredibly cost prohibitive. Most importantly, the current configuration will help keep properties safe! You can expect to see construction start in the late Summer once we receive all the proposals from contractors.

The Carolwood project truly is an amazing collaboration. As you know we were able to partner with the City of San Antonio and Bexar County for funding. Most recently we met with the San Antonio River Authority and we are exploring collaborative options with them as well. If all goes to plan, we will have support from SAWS too for some of the infrastructure in the work area. Talk about a team effort!

Once Glentower, North Manton, and Carolwood are done, the only straggler should be Moss. Make no mistake that we already have our sights set! We are currently assessing the most practical route to extend its useful life. The hope is to have Moss on the list to be done before 2025!

Lastly, the most trafficked corridor that we are responsible for is West Avenue. Our engineers are currently assembling a 3 phased plan to address West Avenue. The first step is addressing the small spots of base failures that are creating large potholes around Antonian. This will hopefully be done by the time you are receiving this newsletter. The next phase will be reconstruction of a segment between Antonian and Castle Hills Christian Church. This will include assistance from SAWS in regards to the trenching of the road near the drainage channel; this has been an issue for almost 20 years. You can expect to see this during the summer. The last phase will be a sealcoat of all of West Avenue. The plan is to do that during the holidays in November.

Recently, I visited with our City Manager Ryan Rapelye about our street improvements. It is astonishing to see the progress we have made in streets in just 5 years. Nearly every single street has some level of maintenance or reconstruction to help extend its useful life. From the bottom of my heart, thank you for your confidence in City Staff and City Council in trusting us to be good fiscal stewards of your hard-earned dollars.

Community Policing

After the tragedy in Uvalde, we have been working extra diligently to train our staff to better handle these unfortunate events. Aside from training our team, it is also important that we share that training. One of our officers, Detective Wright, was invited to instruct an active shooter training called "CRAZE" Citizens Responding to Active Shooter Events to the





This summer, the City of Castle Hills will be taking steps to develop the FY 25 Fiscal Year Budget. The FY 25 Budget will begin on October 1, 2024. We will be wrapping up the current nine-month budget on September 30, 2024. Previously, the City of Castle Hills fiscal budget operated from January 1 through December 31. We have now taken the necessary steps to change the fiscal year to eventually run from October 1 through September 30, which is consistent with many cities in the State of Texas.

This year during the development of the FY 25 Budget, we will start earlier than in previous years. We will have a workshop later in May to kick off the development of the FY 25 budget which was typically done in July. Staff will be working with City Council to prioritize areas of the organization, specifically the Fire department, focusing on the compensation in comparison to other cities to ensure we are competitive to recruit and retain firefighters, also finalizing the allocation of the federal funds related to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), and evaluating other areas related to services for the City of Castle Hills. Every year when we develop the budget, it is not only about revenue and expenditures, but also a review of City services consistent with best practices for our organization to improve and evolve in the coming years. We will also review the next round of street projects, specifically streets which require a mill/overlay. We will also be considering further improvements for the Commons and review other projects related to City services.

As for the development of the upcoming FY 25 Fiscal Year Budget, we will have a budget calendar presented to City Council in May. This will consist of a series of meetings which will be late May and in June with adoption of the annual budget taking place in September. A copy of the budget calendar will be on the website later this month for anyone who wishes to attend any upcoming budget meetings this Summer.

As always, I would like to send a THANK YOU to all our employees who make up "Team Castle Hills" for their commitment to the City. I appreciate all they do for the city and our organization on a daily basis.

Hello, neighbors.

I wanted to give a quick update on our street improvement projects that are coming up.

Lockhill-Selma and Carolwood Drainage Improvements

City Manager Rapelye reports that our City's engineers are working on potential utility conflicts with SAWS and CPS Energy. Once this has been completed, the City will go out to bid on the project. As of right now, we anticipate beginning construction of the drainage and road improvements later this summer. These improvements have been long-needed and will greatly improve our safety and quality of life; however, the work will cause significant upheaval to our neighbors living in the construction zone (including myself). Once we have a better understanding of construction plans and timing, Mr. Rapelye and I plan to have one or more town hall meetings that will be open to the public, but specifically geared at informing the affected residents of what we can expect and how to start planning for the inevitable interruptions to our daily lives. We'll have more information about times and places in a later update, so stay tuned.

Calming Traffic on South Winston

In other street improvement news, I have an update on a citizen request. This Aggie's second-favorite Longhorn Mr. Wayne Carter* spoke to the Council some months back requesting that we look into traffic calming devices, namely speed humps (which are generally longer and less severe that speed bumps) to reduce speeding on South Winston. As I write, our City's Engineers are finishing up their comprehensive speed study throughout the City and will determine if it is necessary to re-evaluate our city-wide speed limit of 30 MPH. Once we have the study, the City Manager and Council will review the recommendations from the City's engineers on which streets would benefit the most from having a traffic calming device, this will be done on a case-by-case basis for implementation in the FY2025 budget.

As always, we welcome any input or suggestions you have on these or any other matters that affect your life in Castle Hills.

With our city's renewed focus on economic development I've been taking a fresh look at our business community as I drive

around town, and it has been a real eye-opener. Whether you've just moved in or have lived here for many years, there's a lot to see! Here are some examples of only a part of what's available to us in our 2-1/2-square-mile city.

Our shopping centers offer a variety of retail stores, from pet supplies to furniture to jewelry to sporting goods, and more; restaurants featuring cuisine from around the world and around the country, as well as coffee and special treats; a craft beer brewery; and personal and professional services. Friends and Neighbors,

As I write this article, we just completed another successful Fiesta Castle Hills. The parade and festival get larger and more fun with each passing year. There seems to be more and more young families with children, which adds to the fun and bodes well for our future. We owe a huge debt of gratitude to Castle Hills Community organization (CHCO) leaders Norma McClelland and Judy Crawford and their team for another job well done. Their year-long planning effort assured a wonderful event enjoyed by hundreds of Castle Hills residents as well as neighbors from many surrounding communities.

In the last edition of The Reporter, I offered updates on the activities of the Parks and Projects Commission (P and P) and Economic Development Committee. The volunteers of P and P continue to make good progress, and we expect the construction of the Commons new permanent stage to begin in the June/July timeframe. If all goes well, construction of seven concrete sculpture pedestals should begin at about the same time.

Meanwhile, the city continues to make progress with Comprehensive Plan priorities. Following Council approval, City Manager Rapelye signed a contract with Creative Civilization, a leading advertising, marketing, and public relations firm, to develop a comprehensive branding strategy for our city. This is the #2 priority of the Comp Plan. Please see a description of the project elsewhere in this publication. This undertaking is a critical piece in our economic development effort to develop a marketing plan for Castle Hills. It will be funded by the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant.

Progress is also being made on the next Comp Plan priority, developing more green space for the city. Our city engineers have been engaged to complete the design of the drainage channel that begins at East Castle between S. Manton and Zornia and runs all the way to West Avenue. Although the hydraulics do not allow for the channel to be a linear park as we had hoped, they will study the addition of a walking trail running along the channel, thus allowing residents to enjoy the lovely country feel of this neighborhood. One of the critical pieces of this idea will be acquiring permission of property owners to allow this trail on their property. We look forward to those discussions once a concept plan has been developed.





Spring Fire Safety Tips

The weather is getting warmer. While doing your spring cleaning and preparing for summer, don't forget to add some fire safety tips to your list. By following these simple tips, you can help reduce the risk of a fire happening in your home.

One of the most important things you can do to prevent a fire is to keep your home clean. Make sure to dispose of winter foliage and any clutter that was collected over the winter. Here are some additional tips to make sure we all have a fire safe summer.

1. Clear out any clutter from your home, especially in hallways and stairways.

Make sure that all of your exits are clear and have a clear path to them. If you have any items blocking an exit, move them immediately. This ensures your family will have good escape routes should you need to evacuate due to fire.

2. Check your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors

Test your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors to ensure they are working properly. Now is an excellent time to

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install them if you don't have any. Replace your carbon monoxide and smoke detector batteries and look for any corrosion on the batteries or their connection points in the device.

3. Don't use electrical appliances or tools with frayed cords

If you have any electrical appliances or tools with frayed electrical cords, replace them as soon as possible. Using damaged electrical cords could start a fire. This is also an excellent time to check your extension cords too. Too many devices plugged in can overload the outlet and cause a fire.

5. Check all your appliances to make sure they are in good working condition.

This includes your stove, oven, microwave, toaster, coffee maker, and anything else you use daily. If you notice any issues with an appliance, have it repaired or replaced as soon as possible.

6. It's a great time to clean your clothes dryer vent and lint trap

Regularly clean your clothes dryer lint trap. Lint is highly combustible and can easily cause a fire if it isn't removed. Clean your dryer vent and hoses at least once a year to remove and prevent any excess lint buildup or blockages.

7. Trim any trees or bushes that are close to your home.

Trimming away any bushes or trees that are too close to your house creates a "defensible space" between your home and potential fire sources. Additionally, if you have dead or dying trees, now is an excellent time to remove them. Dead vegetation is highly flammable and can easily catch fire.

8. Check your gas grill for rust, worn parts, grease, and other debris before use

Grilling is a popular spring and summer activity, but it's essential to ensure your grill is clean and in safe operational order. Remove any rust, grease, or debris built up over the winter. Inspect all parts to make sure they are in good working condition. If you notice any worn parts, have them replaced. It's a great time to check your grill's propane tank for gas leaks. Move the grill at least 10 ft. away from the house before using.

9. Make sure your home's address is visible from the street.



STRAWBERRY POUND CAKE TOWER

(A pound cake is named after the measurement needed for each of the first 4 ingredients)

For Cake:

- 1 lb. (4 sticks) butter
- 1 lb. (2 cups) sugar
- 1 lb. (9 large) eggs
- 1 lb. (4 cups) flour
- 2 Tbsp. vanilla
- 3/4 cup sour cream

For Topping:

This cake makes a large amount feel free to cut in half if only making

for your family

- 3 pints (6 cups) strawberries
- 1 cup sugar
- 16 oz. whipped cream

Directions:

Preheat oven to350 degrees. Butter and flour 2 8-inch round pans. Beat the softened butter on medium until creamy and then add sugar and sour cream Mix for 2 minutes. Add eggs to mixture. Add vanilla and then flour gradually, 1/2 cup at a time beating after each. At end - beat for additional 2 minutes. Spread batter evenly in prepared pans. Bake for 45 minutes. Cool for 20 minutes, then invert cakes onto cooling rack. Let them cool in the refrigerator for 1 hour. Using a long, serrated knife - barely cut off the tops of the cakes to make them flat. Then create 2 layers from each cake by slicing them in half horizontally. Wash strawberries, remove stems, and cut berries in half. Mix wit sugar and refrigerate for at least 1 hour while juices develop. Assemble the tower in layers, starting with cake, strawberry mixture, and whipped cream. Repeat layers. Top with a couple of whole strawberries as a garnish.



CINNAMON ROLL COFFEE CAKE

FOR COFFEE CAKE:

(boxed yellow cake mix can be substituted For the first 4 ingredients)

- 2 1/4 c. unbleached all purpose flour
- 1 lb. (2 cups) sugar
- 1 1/2 c. sugar
- 3 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 4 eggs
- 3/4 c. vegetable oil
- 1 c. sour cream
- 1 c. brown sugar

For Icing:


- 1/4 c. milk

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Crape Myrtles, those delightful flowering trees, grace the Texas landscape with their vibrant blossoms. The timing of their blooms can vary based on several factors. Let's dive into the details:



Bloom Times:

Some crape myrtles burst into bloom as early as May, with large clusters of flowers appearing on the tips of new branches.

Other varieties may wait until July or even later to showcase their colorful blossoms.

The blooming season extends into fall, ensuring a prolonged display of floral beauty.

Post-Bloom Care:

After the flowers fade and fall from the tree, consider **trimming** the fruit from the plant. This practice can stimulate additional blooms within 30 to 45 days.

Keep in mind that the amount of sunlight your crape myrtles receive significantly impacts their flowering. They thrive in full sun, and light shade can reduce flower production, while full shade might prevent blooming altogether.

Late winter or early spring is the ideal time to prune your crape myrtles. Without leaves, you can easily assess the branch structure and selectively remove any necessary branches.

Light and proper pruning can lead to larger flowers and more abundant blooms.

Avoid heavy pruning, as it may delay blooming by several weeks. Applying high-phosphorus, slow-release fertilizer in early spring promotes healthy growth, disease resistance, and vibrant blooms.



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
