
#### COUNCIL APPOINTS NEW CITY MANAGER MICHAEL STEELE, M.P.A.

Dr. Michael Steele and his wife, Conny, discovered the San Antonio area quite by accident. While living in Michigan, they were watching the Alamo Bowl when a special came on about Central Texas. They were so impressed by what they saw that they planned a trip to the area, rented a car, and went exploring from San Antonio to Austin. Based on this driving adventure, they knew that they had found their future home. Based on this incident, Mike has tried several times to convince his wife that they should indeed watch more college football- so far to no avail, unfortunately.

Dr. Steele comes to us from the City of Burnet, Texas, where he served as City Manager for six years. He started in the management profession in September of 1995 in Sparks, Nevada, as the Senior Administrative Analyst and Emergency Management Coordinator. From there, he became the City Manager in Croswell, Michigan. Before becoming a city manager, Mike was a dentist for 17 years in Fountain Valley and South Lake Tahoe, California; a high-altitude, underwater salvage diver for one year at Lake Tahoe, Nevada; and, a fire fighter posted to a truck (rescue) company in Sparks, Nevada. Mike has Doctorate in Dental Surgery, a Masters degree in Public Administration, a Bachelor degree in History, and an Associate of Science degree in Fire Science and Technology.

Mike and Conny, a Marriage and Family Therapist, have been married for 21 years. Conny has worked in Child Protective Services in two states and is currently the Program Director for a domestic violence shelter.

Both Mike and Conny are avid animal lovers. They have been rescuing Dalmatians for 23 years and have established a rescue foundation. They currently have four rescued and deaf Dalmatians, which is like having 6 children. His hobbies are weight lifting, running, and traveling. Both he and his wife are active in service and professional organizations.

- Amending employee personnel policy to reflect that standard mileage rates and meals and incidentals are paid at current federal government rates—passed unanimously.

#### **NOVEMBER 9, 2010**

#### Consider:

- Ordinance amending Chapter 22 to allow the painting of house numbers in a City approved format on residential curbs; permit required—passed unanimously.
- Appeal from Aetna Sign Group requesting to install LED bulbs on the existing Gold Unlimited sign at 1013 NW Loop 410 passed unanimously.
- Accepting a proposal for audit services from Armstrong, Vaughan, & Associates, P.C. to conduct FY2010 annual city audit and authorizing the Interim City Manager to sign an engagement letter—passed unanimously.
- Casting a vote for Bill Martin to the VIA Board of Trustees to serve for the period of January 2011 through January 2013 to represent the VIA Suburban Cities—passed unanimously.
- Amending Chapter 30 Garage/Estate Sales relating to vehicle parking during sales, frequency of sales, and allowing for rain checks—only two sales per year and must be held 90 days apart; rain checks will be allowed-passed three to two, Councilmember Gregory and Davis voted against; Mayor Harper broke the tie vote.
- Extending the Commons area onto the Persimmon lot for development of a neighborhood playground and public garden-no action taken.

Last election day the citizens of Castle Hills voted on a proposed bond issue. A huge 1784 ballots were cast and by a margin of 66 votes the bond was rejected. Approximately, \$1,000,000 held in the Street Maintenance Sales Tax Fund (which was to be used as protection against cost overruns or to be placed in a sinking fund for the bond), will now be available for immediate use.

Several committees over the last ten years carefully looked at <u>every</u> street to determine their physical condition. Engineers, geologists, former city manager Shands and our city

engineer concluded that a long list of streets were in serious decline and needed immediate attention. It was through this careful process that streets were chosen.

Castle Hills simply does not have the tax base needed to provide the cash flow in order to complete major street repairs on the order of \$300,000 to \$500,000 per year. One or two streets might be addressed every few years or so but that fact puts our city in great danger in not being able to address a crumbling infrastructure. Which brings me back to the \$1,000,000 in reserve. I will propose that all major drainage projects be addressed first. Good streets or alleys will be in danger if drainage is not excellent. Once this is addressed the rest can follow. However, at the rate of \$175,000 per year (from the 1/4% sales tax), it will take, assuming prices will never rise, 154 years to repair, resurface and fix all streets, alleys and drains or 71 years to fix just those items in the failed bond election.

So here we are. The \$1,000,000 can and will be put to work. Every few years or so a street in serious decline can be slated for repair. Almost everything else must be put on hold. There might be other methods to raise necessary funds but for now the political will to do more, as expressed by the voter, is currently, not there. It was a great turnout, stay involved, engaged, and <u>informed</u>. Together we will move Castle Hills into a better brighter future.

#### To Pay or Not to Pay

With the election over and the votes counted, it's clear that once again the City is divided. Welcome to the past. Ah, the good old days. More than half the voters rejected the Bond Issue, and almost as many favored the Bond Issue. To repair our failing streets and correct serious drainage problems will require millions of dollars. I've heard residents complain "I pay taxes. I shouldn't have to pay for street repair." Your taxes pay to provide City services like a Fire Department, a Police Department, a Municipal Court and City Hall. Salaries and services are funded from a bare bones budget strained by the rising costs of

everything from gasoline to utilities. The City has cut positions and reduced some services; there's nothing left to eliminate. If you put 6 apples in a bag, you can not pull out 7 apples. It's as simple as that. Take the following example. Four friends decide to by a home at the coast or the lake. They each agree to pay one quarter of the cost of the house. Two years later the house needs a new roof (and no, insurance isn't going to pay for it). Two of the friends say, "I paid my share for the house, my share of the monthly utilities, and my share of the annual taxes. I shouldn't have to pay any more." The other two friends say, "Why should we pay to fix the roof on a house you're also going to enjoy." Clearly, the four should have discussed and established a maintenance plan or fund to insure the upkeep of the house.

In 2001- 2002, the voters approved the  $\frac{1}{4}$  of 1 per cent sales tax to maintain our streets. These funds were used to complete a few street projects. But as the economy began declining, so did sales tax revenue from our city's businesses. Encouragement from the City Council to "Shop Castle Hills" has not provided the support to businesses we had hoped and many businesses have closed or left Castle Hills. As Councilman McGuire has pointed out, sales tax revenue accounts for a small percentage of our revenue. I agree with him that even if we increase our sales tax base, it is not and probably will not in the near future be the solution to our budgetary strain.

At recent Bond workshops, the City Council was asked if there were other avenues for funding our street and drainage renovations and had the City pursued them. Yes, other avenues were explored. For those who perhaps do not have access to any form of media, there is no federal or state funding available. Texas will have an estimated 18 billion dollar budget short fall this year. I don't think Castle Hills streets and drainage are going to be among Governor Perry's priorities.

So where does that leave us? We can do nothing and let the streets decay further. We can try to patch up and repair what we can with the insufficient Street Fund. A million dollars doesn't go very far with street repair so which few streets do you want to simply re-asphalt? A million dollars won't cover the cost of one of the major drainage problems in our City. So let's just ignore drainage. We could just let water flow wherever, except for that pesky, federally mandated Storm Water Runoff Plan. Or we can roll up our sleeves and start over. Your City Council members are prepared to go back to the drawing board, listen to citizens, learn from the experts and devise the next proposal. That's our job and we're eager to meet the needs of our citizens and our city. But I can guarantee that as much as we would want it, the solutions will not be free from costs. Just like the story above with the four friends, everyone will have to pay their fair share.

#### Castle Hills Police Crime Prevention Workshop Highlights Held October 11, 2010

#### **Topic - Burglary Prevention and Awareness**

Citizens of Castle Hills - thank you for attending and actively participating in our crime prevention workshop held at City Hall on October 11, 2010. Our focus was on residential burglary prevention and awareness. We had a wonderful turnout with a wealth of information shared between the citizenry and police. We also had James Scoggins with the Texas Rangers as a guest speaker.

We started this workshop with some basic information, the difference between a burglary and a robbery, a common misconception made amongst many in the community. Simply put, a burglary is when someone without your consent enters your home and has the intention of committing a felony, theft or an assault. The purpose for the workshop focused on the theft portion of the statute. A robbery is defined as during the course of committing theft a person causes bodily injury, threatens and or places another in fear of imminent bodily injury or death. A full definition of the two can be found in the Texas Penal Code under chapters 29.02 and 30.02.

We covered the basics and provided some useful tips to help you protect your "castle" from a burglary. Although we can not fully protect our homes from all crime we can take a few preventive steps like having a visual alarm sign, keeping your garage door closed, having motion lights, and not letting your newspapers stack up if you are out of town. But the most protective, dependable, and reliable thing we can all do is watch after each other as neighbors. Share information with your neighbors and communicate with them on a regular basis.

If you see something or someone suspicious in YOUR neighborhood call the police, we are here to serve the community. If your call turns out to be nothing that's ok, it's better to be safe than sorry.

#### 'TIS THE SEASON FOR LEAVES



#### § 13.112 SPECIAL REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO COLLECTION OF LEAVES

During the months of <u>November through March</u> regular residential collection of leaves will be restricted to 10 bags per week, no larger than 30-gallons each, to be collected on Monday for residents South of Loop 410 and on Tuesday for residents North of Loop 410.

Residents may not place more than 10 bags, no larger than 30-gallons each, at the curb or in the alley for collection and may not place bags at those locations prior to the Saturday before collection.

Residents who wish to have more than 10 leaf bags, no larger than 30-gallons each, collected at any one time should contact public works to make arrangements for this additional service. The cost for this additional service will be determined by the public works director based on the cost to provide this service.

We will continue to pick up brush on Wednesdays except during a holiday week.

#### **CASTLE HILLS RECYCLES!**

Residents are serviced once a week either curbside or alley. However, there have been a few instances that we were not able to enter the alley because of a utility company blocking the alley. If this occurs, we will remove the recyclables on the next garbage service day so it will be empty for the next week. Please do not place household trash, building materials or pet feces in the bin. We do not separate items in the bin; if there are items mixed with recyclables we will dispose of all the items in the bin with your regular garbage. Please visit our website for a list of acceptable recyclable items. If trash and recyclable are combined, when we take it to the landfill, the dumping is being monitored and the city is not credited properly because of the mixture.

In the third quarter of 2010 Castle Hills recycled 20.26 tons of paper; 3.50 tons of plastic, 5.19 tons of glass. As a result of your paper recycling you saved 344.47 trees, as one ton of recycled paper saves 17 trees!

#### **Leash Law**

Please be reminded that a dog must be under proper restraint at all times if not on the owner's premises. Although cats and fowl shall be exempt from the leash requirement while on the premises of the owner, any cat or fowl straying on the property of anyone except its owner shall be deemed a nuisance animal and will be subject to impoundment and fines.

#### **Pooper Scooper Law**

Be a responsible pet owner. When walking your dog, carry the appropriate materials to pick up and remove waste immediately.

#### **Registration Required**

Are your pets current on their vaccinations? All domestic pets in Castle Hills must be registered with the City. Registration is only \$10. Please bring proof of current rabies vaccination for each pet.


