CASTLE HILLS 2018...THE YEAR IN REVIEW

Castle Hills Residents,

Happy New Year! It is with a tinge of sadness that I tell you that by the time you read this I will no longer be your City Manager. I have fulfilled the year commitment I pledged to the Mayor and City Council when I interviewed, and I have decided to move on to another line of work. In early October, I expressed my intent to the Mayor, at the same time conveying that I was committed to finishing the race strong. With that said, I would like to give you a "Year in Review" for the City of Castle Hills, focusing on some of the team's accomplishments over the past year.

- Laid the groundwork with multiple stakeholders to enter into a settlement agreement with the BASIS charter school, while avoiding the lawsuit which many claimed was "inevitable."
- Developed a fiscally conservative and responsible budget at the previous years' tax rate which, when executed, will produce a \$206,000 surplus to the City for other uses, while also funding several new initiatives for the City.
- Worked closely with the Texas Department of Transportation on everything from the 410/281/San Pedro Corridor Study, to traffic impact analyses, to drainage, to right of way acquisition, and any other myriad of issues.
- Closely coordinated with San Antonio, Bexar County, and the San Antonio River Authority to bring Castle Hills drainage projects into consideration for the Bexar Regional Watershed Management Board program and potential funding in future years.
- Performed asphalt crack sealing and pothole repair utilizing in house resources on a large number of our streets, saving tens of thousands of dollars in contract costs.
- Worked with Bexar County to execute a modified slurry seal on West Avenue
 using an interlocal agreement, saving thousands in solicitation costs and
 gaining economy of scale--approved by Council to be installed in the Spring
 2018, adding 5-8 more years to the current pavement life.
- Submitted two multimodal roadway projects to the Alamo Area Metropolitan Planning Office to hopefully capitalize on a program which provides 80% matching funds to make improvements and enhancements to our roadways.
- Retired a Fire Chief and Fire Captain who had 73 years of service to Castle
 Hills between them, hired a new Chief, promoted two Fire Captains, two
 Fire Lieutenants, and hired three new rookies—that's a lot of turnover for a
 small department!
- Retired a Police Chief and Administrative Sergeant representing 59 years of service to the city, hired a new Chief of Police, and created a Lieutenant slot to improve our Department
- Obtained a Police Department All-Terrain Vehicle to patrol those hard to get to areas on the fringes and alleyways of our city.
- As of December 14, 2017, the Fire Department has responded to 929
 emergency incidents, including approximately 600 EMS calls, 3 structure
 fires, multiple vehicle accidents, alarm calls, and other hazardous incidents
 that required fire department response.
- Through fire prevention and education, firefighters spoke to over 1800 children at area schools and scouting events and participated in over 2000 combined hours of training through fire and rescue classes, area schools, and departmental training.
- Purchased a new ladder truck which would actually service ALL Castle Hills buildings (and before the ISO rating for the old truck expired impacting resident's insurance rates).

- Purchased a new Public Works tractor to replace its 24-year old predecessor which had become a maintenance pig.
- Established the Castle Hills Municipal Court as a Court of Record, increasing its powers and scope while saving costs on cases referred to District Court.
- Hosted many successful events in your City Center...Castle Hills Fiesta, Last Day of School Picnic, Mayor's Back to School Picnic, 4th of July Picnic, Lighting of the Lights, movie nights, Concerts in the Commons, two TxDOT Open Houses, to name a few.
- Designed a drainage solution for N. Manton Lane ready for bids and performed analysis on the drainage channel on Banyan Drive.
- Completed Phase IIB of the City Streets Program, to include a test of a new asphalt additive on Danube Drive which may help resolve some of the cracking problems which plague our roads
- Installed a much-needed crosswalk from the Commons to Castle Hills Elementary School to protect our most cherished resource, our children.
- Placed a new focus on Code Compliance hired a new Code Compliance
 Officer in June, and since that time have witnessed a 352% increase in call/
 work volume with approximately 98% clearance rate versus a 72% clearance
 rate in the same timeframe in 2016.
- Coordinated the repair of all SAWS Infrastructure and full depth roadway repair for Antler Drive/Honeysuckle Lane and commissioned the design as the next Phase in the Streets Program – Coming in 2018!

This really just scratches the surface! I am not taking credit for the accomplishments above. These were a team success headed by your elected officials and carried out by your wonderful City staff and our consultants, stakeholders, and with the assistance of many of our residents. Speaking of our residents, I have met some wonderful people in the City of Castle Hills. Your city truly is an oak tree-laden gem in the heart of the San Antonio Metropolis.

On a final note, I want to thank the Mayor, the Council, the residents, and stakeholders for their support during the past year, with a special thank you to the City staff who works so hard day-to-day to keep the City of Castle Hills operating so smoothly. The staff is very lean, and there are always more things than they can possibly get done, yet they manage to perform and impress without fail and with a customarily good attitude. I will miss working with this group of professionals, and you are blessed to have them on your team! Happy New Year! Here's to an even better 2018 for the City of Castle Hills!

Friends,

The holidays have passed and once again we find ourselves in the home stretch to summer. I trust that everyone had a safe and enjoyable

holiday season with their friends and family. If you were able to join us for the Lighting of Lights in December, I hope you had a great time. It is moments like this that make me glad to live in our small community that becomes a big family! There are so many people to thank for such a successful event. All City staff did an incredible job of working together. We also had many volunteers throughout the community that came together to help. Everyone's favorite was definitely the snow slide, a big thank you to Quentin and Jana Baker for their generosity.

As many observed on December 12th, we hosted the 3rd open forum to review TxDOT's feasibility study regarding work in the 410 and 281 area. The meeting was held with emphasis on discussing the proposed changes affecting Castle Hills. While there are a few substantial changes, the most controversial



one is the closing of Honeysuckle under 410 to through traffic. In a time where all cities are working to improve their walkability infrastructure, I feel that this change would really further divide Castle Hills. Aside from the walkability aspect, I have concerns regarding first responder access, speed of traffic on the frontage road, and the safety of those who will try to merge with traffic on the frontage road.

I would be remiss if I did not thank TxDOT for approaching the City to start a dialogue. It is imperative that we be able to provide input and let you the citizens know what is proposed to happen, before it is done. As your elected officials, we are certainly entitled to our opinion but; it is our responsibility to act in the best interest of the City. The 200 or so people that were present on December 12th stood in unison and made it clear to TxDOT and Council that they were not in favor of the closure of Honeysuckle. I must applaud our citizens for their civic engagement and their ability to rally together to present a united front. My parents always taught me that while you will "catch more flies with honey than with vinegar", kindness does not constitute weakness. On December 12th, our City exemplified that statement. Citizens were respectful and kind, but firmly opposed the closing of Honeysuckle.

As you all have seen, our Legislators and their staff frequent our meetings and events as they like to be connected to our City. In my year and a half in office I have developed strong relationships with State Senator Jose Menendez, State Representative Diego Bernal, and their respective staffs. While a great deal of issues are handled locally, here in Castle Hills, there are times when we rely on our legislators. The closure of Honeysuckle is

one of those times. While both Senator Menendez and Representative Bernal understand the need for infrastructure upgrades to our State roads, they realize the effects that those big changes can have on a small city like Castle Hills. I'd like to thank Senator Menendez and Representative Bernal for asking TxDOT to re-evaluate the need for permanently closing Honeysuckle. Fortunately, we are still in the early stages of the project. If you would like to vocalize your opinion I would urge you to contact your elected officials as well as the TxDOT team. I've said on many occasions that our elected officials are here to serve you.

On a much lighter note, I would like to congratulate Chief Wayne Davis and Sergeant Steve Hart on their retirement. Between these two gentlemen they have served the City of Castle Hills for 50 years, Sergeant Hart for 30 years and Chief Davis for 20 years. On December 12th we were able to formally recognize these two gentlemen for their selflessness and their service to our City. While Chief Davis is stepping away, I would like to formally welcome our new Police Chief, Johnny Siemens. Chief Siemens recently completed the FBI Academy and is eager to make the Castle Hills Police Department better than ever. I encourage you to approach him at our next council meeting and introduce yourself.

Lastly, I have provided email addresses for our elected officials, as well as, the email address being used for the TxDOT project. Please reach out to them and let them know how you feel. COUNCIL MEETING

HIGHLIGHTS



October 24, 2017 City Council Regular Meeting

- John Kinney, Castle Hills Community Organization President, presented the Castle Hills Police Department with a check for \$2,541.34 for the purchase of new exercise equipment. Mayor Howell and Police Chief Siemens expressed their appreciation for the CHCO Donation.
- Fire Chief Dover accepted Mayor Pro-Tern Trevino's invitation to participate in the "No Shave November" in support of Prostate Cancer Awareness Month.
- Mayor Howell and the Council expressed their appreciation to all who attended the TxDOT Open House on October 17th, regarding a feasibility study identifying potential improvements near Interstate 410 to US 281 San Pedro interchange.
- A Little Free Library will be placed at 122 N. Manton by Girl Scout Troop 300 to Honor the City of San Antonio Tricentennial.
- The Council approved, Resolution R2017-10-24-A, authorizing the City Manager to enter into an agreement with RPS Klotz Associates for the extension of the design on Antler Drive to include the stretch from Atwater to Jackson-Keller on the revised project design of Phase III of the Street Program for \$160,000.

November 14, 2017 City Council Regular Meeting

- Resolution R2017-11-14-A, adopting the Bexar County Hazard Mitigation Plan 2017, was approved by Council.
- Ordinance 2017-11-14-B, approving the 2017 Certified Tax Roll, was approved by Council.
- Ordinance 2017-11-14-C, amending the Building Permit Fee Schedule for projects valued between \$500.00 to \$2,000.00 was approved by Council.

November 28, 2017 City Council Work Session

- Discussion on the plan to initiate online permit applications with city staff to conduct a presentation at the January 2018 City Council Meeting.
- Discussion on the financing options for the purchase of a ladder fire truck from Siddons-Martin. This item to be presented at the City Council Meeting on December 12, 2017.
- Discussion on the purchase of a multi-purpose tractor for public works. This item to be presented at the December 12, 2017 City Council Meeting.
- Discussion on nomination of Amy McLin for the 2018 Election of the Bexar Appraisal District Board of Directors. This item to be presented at the December 12, 2017 City Council Meeting.

City Manager Van De Walle advised the Council Members that one LED pole light will be installed at the Commons with additional units to be added later.
- Discussion on the Letter of Engagement from Armstrong, Vaughan

- & Associates to conduct the 2017 Fiscal Year Audit.
- Discussion on the Walkability Committee, City Manager Van De Walle advised the Council Members that he would look into reigniting the Committees efforts and provide an update at an upcoming City Council Meeting.
- Discussion on the Microsoft Tech Summit and future participation, City Manager Van De Walle stated he would advise our IT consultant to encourage his participation.
- Discussion on the status of projects assigned to Council Members; Council Member McLin provided an update on the various projects; such as the Employee Survey, Strategic Planning Retreat, City's Organization Plan, Concierge Valet Refuse Service, and the Passport Application Acceptance Site. Council all expressed support for the various projects that would benefit our residents and enhance our community;
- Discussion on the implementation of an Internship Program in collaboration with Saint Mary's University of Law Practice Credit Program; City Manager Van De Walle stated that he would look into the program and provide them an update in the next few weeks.

December 12, 2017 City Council Special/Regular Meeting

- Resolution No. R2017-12-12A, allocating five votes for city nominee Amy McLin for the Bexar Appraisal District Board of Directors 2018 Election, Council approved.
- Resolution No. R2017-12-12B, authorizing the City Manager to sign the Letter of Engagement from Armstrong, Vaughan & Associates, P.C., to conduct the 2017 Fiscal Year Audit, Council approved.
- Resolution No. R2017-12-12C, authorizing the City Manager to sign a Purchase Agreement for a ladder fire truck from Siddons-Martin for the purchase price of \$1,049,924.00, with amount not to exceed \$1,113,000.00 in total financing, Council approved.
- Resolution No. R2017-12-12D, authorizing the City Manager to sign a Purchase Agreement for a Kubota Grand L 3560 HSTC Cab Tractor with attachments and a two-year warranty for an amount not to exceed \$27,358.11, Council approved.
- The Council approved the City Manager to confirm the venue reservation and sign an Agreement for Consultant Services for the 2018 City Council Strategic Planning Retreat.
- The Council held a Public Hearing on a replat application from 6812 West LLC; to establish Castle Hills West Avenue Plat being a 1.462 acre tract of land establishing Lots 16 (0.5014 Acres) and 17 (0.9609 Acres) out of Block 8, County Block 5778, being a portion out of Lot 6 Block 8, County Block 5778, Castle Hills Subdivision, as Recorded in Volume 980, Page 393, of the Deed and Plat Records of Bexar County, Texas, out of the Joseph McClelland Survey No. 326, Abstract No. 504, Bexar County Texas. The Council approved the plat.
- Resolution No. R2017-12-12-F, in recognition of retired Police Sergeant, Steve Hart.
- Resolution No. R2017-12-12-G, in recognition of retiring Chief of Police, Wayne Davis.
- Recognition of Johnny Siemens as the new Castle Hills Chief of Police.

Good Fences Make Good Neighbors

I am proud of our Code Compliance Program, which is often one of the least understood but most important disciplines on the City staff. This year alone our new Code Compliance officer has increased the activity of that office by a whopping 352% from the same period last year! That said, from time to time we have citizens who call in or submit online complaints in reference to code violations, usually on one of their neighbors. We research every one of these complaints. In many cases, it results in notification of residents or businesses that they are indeed in violation of our code. Often, the responsible party takes care of the issue on the first notification, and the problem gets solved. In a few instances, the cases may reach the point of a Municipal Court adjudication. However, there are quite a number of cases which result in dissatisfied complainants due to the fact that no action can be taken. This leads to a perception that code compliance is turning a blind eye to a problem.

The thing to remember, is that the City staff has their hands tied when the code is not specific in a particular area. In order to have a true code violation, the issue must be first addressed by the code in the applicable section. Common sense might dictate that there is a code violation, but if it is not written into the code, then there is little the staff can do about it. A resident, or group of residents, can always recommend to Council that there be a change made to a specific code.

Of course, the other side of this coin is that the staff must always respect the Constitutional Rights of our residents. A code violation, to be valid, must be viewable from the public Right-Of-Way. This does not mean that because you can see your neighbors unkept pool from a second-story window of your home that it's a violation for the City. While you are free to report it to code compliance, if the officer can not see it from the Public Right-Of-Way when he goes out, then it's not a violation that is citable.

So, what is the solution? Your first step, when submitting a code complaint, should be to research the online code that can be found on our City website. Look it up and ensure there is a code violation to be addressed. Knowledge is power. You can always file a grievance against your neighbor, in court, if you feel the legal process does not represent your personal interests. However, in most cases, people are reasonable. A polite request to your neighbor to address the possible violation; measured with tact and grace, can usually achieve the best and quickest results.

While the code can create a "fence" of sorts between neighbors; fences tended and manicured with mutual respect for both sides can resolve many issues easily. Perhaps the best advice regarding code compliance issues may have been given by Robert Frost in his poem, the Mending Wall: "Good fences make good neighbours."

In the New Year, resolve to be a good neighbor. Mend the fence of code compliance with your neighbor, where it needs mending. Walk that fence together in mutual respect for one another. Wishing you all a compliant and quiet New Year.

New Year

As we start out the New Year, the Fire Department will have a new addition to its fleet. We will have a new "Platform" Ladder Truck in service that will replace our existing 20 year old truck. This new ladder truck is quite impressive, and massive to say the least. The new truck will now stand at over 12' tall. This becomes an issue with many of our homes in the city. After recent storms, it was noted that many of our beautiful trees fall well under the mandatory minimum clearance for our roadways required by city code Sec. 48.137.

We have beautiful trees that add to the aesthetics of our great neighborhoods, but with low hanging limbs it makes it very difficult for our fire trucks to navigate the streets. This can lead to slower response times in emergencies, as well as the potential to damage the fire trucks themselves.

Beginning in January, the Fire Department along with Code Compliance will begin notifying homeowners of low hanging limbs that fall below the required fourteen-foot mark over the roadways and alleys.

- A fourteen foot clearance must be maintained under all weather conditions.
- Please trim/remove low branches overhanging onto the right-of-way.
- A permit is required when trimming branches, and may be obtained at city hall. The permit office can be reached at 210-293-9675.
- Please paint any open cut within one hour of trimming.
- Remove cuttings within 48 hours upon competition of work which
 may require notification of public works to arrange removal of the
 bulk trimmings. Public Works may be reached at 210-293-9676.

Failure to maintain the proper clearance may result in a summons being issued for appearance in municipal court and may result in fines or other penalties. We greatly appreciate your cooperation, and please to do not hesitate to call us, if we can be of any assistance. We wish all of you a very happy new year!

As with many crimes, vehicle burglaries are often a crime of opportunity. Here are a few tips to make yourself a hard target for 2018.

- · always secure your vehicle
- hide valuables in the trunk or anywhere out of sight
- park in well-lit and/or well populated areas
- · when practical, remove valuables from your vehicle altogether

Remember this phrase; "hide, lock, take"

With no valuables in sight and a secure vehicle, would be criminals are more likely to move on to the next one. Don't be "the next one".

Lastly, let us remind you that tax season is just around the corner. As such, so are debit/credit card abusers and forgers. Take extra caution to secure your personal information. This most certainly includes debit/credit cards, id's, and social security numbers. One of the primary areas of compromise is at the mailbox. We have previously posted the following; The business strategy is simple..."If the red flag is up, game on." This is a quote from the leader of an organized crime enterprise that was recently arrested for mail theft and check fraud/forgery. It refers to the flag on your mailbox providing the requisite visual que for the USPS that you have mail you would like picked up and ultimately delivered. Herein lies the issue. USPS employees are not the only ones looking for mail in your mailbox. A growing trend is for opportunistic criminals to drive around neighborhoods searching for mailboxes that have their flags raised, indicating outgoing mail for them to steal. More aptly, mail theft is perhaps the preferred way for criminals to steal your identity.

Happy New Year and Safe Driving

This year, make a resolution to travel on the road in a safe vehicle. You can start by checking your vehicle inside and out. Here are a few starting places to get you going.

Walk around the vehicle and check for any damage that may have been cause by road debris.

Check the lights on your vehicle to make sure they are working properly:

- · headlights
- blinkers
- brakes
- hazards
- fog
- · tail lights

Inspect your tires for cracks, wear on the treads, bubbles on the tire walls, and tire pressure. Also, don't forget to rotate them every 5,000 to 7,000 miles, depending on how often you drive the vehicle.

Inspect your windows for cracks and other damage, as well. Windows need to be washed to prevent buildup of dirt, which can make it hard to see out of them. Don't forget to clean the inside of the windows too!

Make sure your mirrors are clean and adjusted properly.

Make sure seatbelt straps don't have any snags or tears in them and check that the buckles snap together properly.

Check your vehicle's fluid levels. Your vehicle has many fluids which need to be maintained:

- engine
- · power steering
- brakes
- AC coolant
- · washer fluid

Keep your vehicle clean and minimize the amount of unsecured objects in the vehicle. Properly stowing loose articles can help minimize potential distractions as you drive.

Inspect your windshield wipers. Check that the wiper blades are in good condition, and that the wipers themselves operate without any problems. Check your emergency kit. Make sure everything is ready to go and in good condition. Replace anything that has expired, and refill or replace anything that has been used. If you don't have an emergency kit in your vehicle, consider putting one together.

As always, if you think there might be a problem with your vehicle, have a reputable mechanic check it over. Unsafe vehicles can be a danger; not just to you and your passengers, but to other drivers and their passengers as well. Remember, safety doesn't happen by accident.

New Tree Trimming Requirements

Effective January 1, 2018, all trees, shrubs, vines, hedges, palms or other vegetation that overhangs or obtrudes upon any pavement, roadway, alley, or curb must be trimmed to a minimum of 14 feet during all weather conditions. Vegetation may remain at 12 feet minimum clearance over sidewalks.

The City of Castle Hills Fire Department has purchased a new ladder truck which has a minimum vertical clearance of 12 feet 3 inches. The former city code required a minimum of 12 feet of vertical clearance. The new truck exceeds the current minimum clearance. When nature sends rain, wind or ice the weight of the moisture and the movement of the vegetation pulls the vegetation or branches downward increasing the likelihood of the fire truck striking or rubbing on the vegetation or branches which will damage the fire truck.

Mayor Howell and the city council are requesting that all property owners trim to the minimum 14-foot clearance as soon as possible. Oak trimming is prohibited from February 1st through June 30th to aid in preventing the spread of oak wilt. The fees for tree trimming permits to raise the vegetation to the new 14-foot minimum will be waived until February 1, 2018.

With a sticker price of approximately \$1,050,000, and the importance of having the ladder truck in safe working condition it is vital for all property owners to comply with the minimum vegetation vertical clearance of 14 feet over roads, alley, and curbs. Thank you for helping to ensure that emergency responders can get to the emergency safely.




